

Daniel L. Cork is a senior program officer for the Committee on National Statistics, currently serving as study director of the Panel to Review the 2010 Census. He joined the CNSTAT staff in 2000, and has served as study director or program officer for several CNSTAT census panels, including the Panels on Residence Rules in the Decennial Census, Research on Future Census Methods (2010 Planning panel), Design of the 2010 Census Program of Experiments and Evaluations, and Review of the 2000 Census.
